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WHAT'S COMING UP?

RACE FEES

With the Summer season coming soon, all boats will soon be invited to register for their season racing and pay their race fees through the SailSys portal. In the near future our yacht skippers and boat administrators will receive additional information to guide them through the new course-based series registration.

SAFETY AUDIT DAY

The 2024 Keelboat Safety Audit Day is programmed on 24th August. This date is two weeks after the last 2024 winter race, two weeks before the pre-season working bee, and three weeks prior to the first summer series race on 14th September.

All boats are urged to start planning now by printing off your Audit Form found on our new CSC website under the <u>SAILING/SAILING DOCUMENTATION</u> link. Before safety day all boats must restock expired items like EPIRBS, flares, first aid items, batteries and please complete a self-inspection form for each of your PFDs. On the day, make sure your fire extinguishers are on the dock first thing in the morning as testing is only offered by CSC on Saturday morning; all your safety equipment must be laid out in audit form order prior to your booked inspection time. Boats not ready will be reallocated an inspection time later in the day.

Boat owners will receive booking times and other details in the coming week.

Once you have your completed audit form, it will be up to each boat owner to post their completed Safety Audit Form and Insurance Certificate of Currency in their Boat's document library on SailSys.

SAFETY AUDITORS

The same CSC Safety Officer team has fulfilled the vital service of yacht and CSC support boat safety inspections for at least two decades and it is vital that we start planning for orderly succession. We now need you to help build the next generation of Safety Auditors. It's your time to support these legends. Whether you have a boat or not, with some basic online training and CSC mentoring, we welcome you to become one of our next generation of CSC Safety Auditors. Unfortunately we lost an active sailing member (and all round great guy) this month. Doug Surmon, owner/skipper of Blue Amber has been involved in the club for many years. Doug and his children Shinead and Thomas both sailed MG's at the club for a number of years before Doug made the step to the yacht fleet and purchased his catamaran. Doug's family celebrated his life at the Club after his funeral and shared many stories of his adventures. It was clear that the Club was a big part of his life and we feel extremely lucky to have had Doug as part of our history.

Sadly we also lost Keith Fleming, a past member of the Club. Keith sailed VS's with his brother Bob at the club for many years before moving to St George Sailing Club. Keith's parents Val and Harold were integral members of the club and



volunteered in many other roles over the years. Harold was a life member and known for his fantastic efforts starting races at CSC for over 20 years.

the need to make membership of the club attractive not only to entice new membership for the club, but of course, to retain the existing members.

Somewhat related to, but not directly linked, to the matter of the licence is the building of the upstairs. There have been several meetings of the newly formed building committee. The members of the committee consist of Max Turner, Andy Britton, Bill Tuite, Peter Van Ryn, and Mal Jones. A lot of effort has been put in by these members, we have had talks to the Council, and the design and constructions materials are now just about finalised. Of course the plans that were approved previously were based very much on achieving the desired end, that is, to get a building approval based on the original development approval, and now we are moving to achieve what we would really like to build.

I would expect that shortly we will be putting before the members a final design proposal for approval with a view to construction work commencing very shortly thereafter.

It is sad to the note the passing away of Harold Fleming, one of our life members.

Harold was the starter at the club during the glory days in the 1960s when I first started sailing in a Vee Jay.

It was nothing to see Harold getting away, by himself, fleets of twenty five Vee Esses, forty Herons, thirty Moths, and fifteen Vee Jays each Sunday. With there being so many boats on the water that on club championship days two classes would hold their club championship races in the morning and the other two classes would hold their club championship races in the afternoon. Somehow Harold managed to get all of the boats away and finished and record the times in a very mixed fleet. I am sure that one of the reasons that the club was so strong in that time was that Harold was such a good starter that the racing was run very efficiently and so more and more



people wanted to race at the club.

Whilst Harold was doing this, of course, Val worked tirelessly in the canteen and Bob and Keith sailed their own Vee Ess.

In the late sixties bob and Keith moved to the 16 foot skiff class at St. George and Harold moved also where he acted as the starter again for many years.

In all Harold was the starter at Cronulla for twenty years and then the starter at the St. George Sailing Club for twentythree years.

Harold was made a life member of both the Cronulla Sailing Club and the St. George Sailing Club and for his efforts a greater reward was deserved.

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HARDSTAND RIGGING DECK BY-LAWS

- 1. Access chain to be unlocked by key holders ONLY.
- 2. Boat and trailer activity to be confined to daylight hours. 3. On race days, last person to use crane must ensure
- arm is positioned correctly and power turned OFF at mains. 4. All halyards to be tied off securely.
- 5. Water hose to be returned to inside of Clubhouse. 6. All garbage and other refuse to be placed in receptacles provided.
